The Central Bureau of Statistics presents the main findings for the Consumer Price Index (CPI) for the month of June 2026

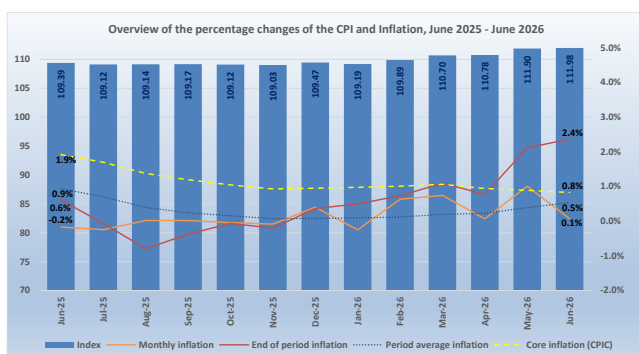

Consumer Price Index for the month of June 2026

The CPI for June 2026 (111.98) increased by 0.1% compared with the index for May 2026 (111.90).

The 12-month percentage change in the CPI (June 2025 to June 2026) is 2.4%, representing an increase of 1.8 percentage points (ppts) compared with the corresponding period a year earlier (0.6%).

The average percentage change in the CPI over the last 24 months, based on the 12-month periods June 2024 to June 2025 and June 2025 to June 2026, is 0.5%. This represents a decrease of 0.4 percentage points compared with the average change of 0.9% recorded for the preceding 24-month period, based on the 12-month periods June 2023 to June 2024 and June 2024 to June 2025.

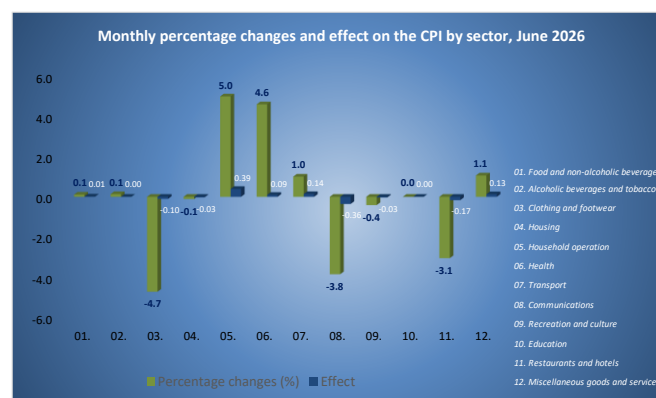


During June 2026, six (6) of the twelve (12) sectors registered price increases. The sectors with the largest impact on the CPI were "Household operation" (5.0%), "Transport" (1.0%) and "Miscellaneous goods and services" (1.1%), contributing 0.39, 0.14 and 0.13 ppts, respectively. The increases in the remaining sectors contributed a combined 0.11 ppts to the CPI for June 2026.

These increases were partially offset primarily by a decrease in the index for the "Communications" sector (-3.8%), which contributed -0.36 ppts to the CPI. The decreases in the remaining sectors contributed a combined -0.33 ppts to the CPI for June 2026.

The increase in the "Household operation" sector was mainly driven by price increases of 8.1% in the category "Household appliances" and 16.9% in the category "Tools and equipment for house and garden", which contributed 0.14 and 0.13 ppts, respectively. The increase in the "Transport" sector was due to a 2.2% increase in the category "Operation of personal transport equipment", which contributed 0.19 ppts to the CPI. The increase in the "Miscellaneous goods and services" sector was mainly due to a 2.7% increase in the category "Personal care", which contributed 0.11 ppts to the CPI.

The decrease in the "Communications" sector was due to a 32.8% decrease in the category "Telephone and telefax equipment", which contributed -0.36 ppts to the CPI.



Consumption basket

The CPI consumption basket consists of 408 goods and services. Compared with May 2026, 49.5% of these products increased in price, contributing 1.18 ppts to the CPI, while 34.8% decreased in price, contributing -1.11 ppts. The remaining 15.7% showed no price change. Compared with May 2026, the prices of goods increased by 0.3%, contributing 0.18 ppts to the CPI, while the prices of services decreased by 0.3%, contributing -0.11 ppts to the CPI in June 2026.

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Core inflation

The CPIC (Core Consumer Price Index), which excludes the effects of energy and food, registered an increase of 0.8% in June 2026. The energy index, comprising electricity, water, gasoline, and diesel, decreased by 1.4%. The food index increased by 1.5%.

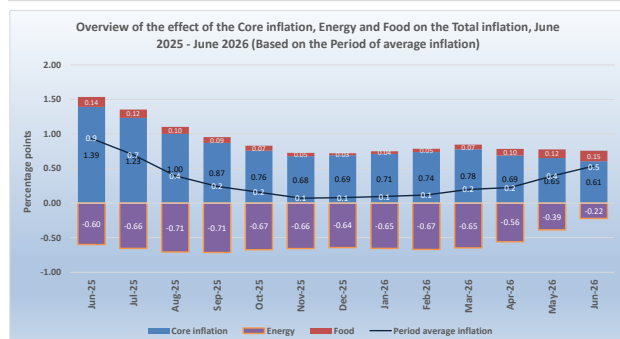
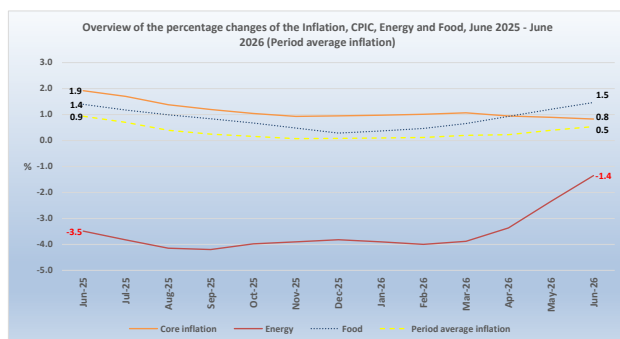
What is CPIC?

The CPIC (core inflation) is a portion of the inflation where certain items, which have volatile price movements, are excluded, such as food products and energy. When calculating the core inflation, the most volatile components are eliminated from the inflation. The core inflation index is used to assess the medium and long-term trends of the general level of prices. For purposes of economic policymaking, especially monetary policy, many economists focus on the proportion of the core inflation, as this allows a more in-depth evaluation of the recent inflation developments in the economy.

The CPIC is calculated by comparing the average index for the most recent 12-month period compared with the preceding 12-month period (Period average).

The three main uses of a CPI are:

1. a calculation method to compensate employees due to the loss of purchasing power, adjusting their salaries, with the percentage change rate of the CPI, which is known as indexation.
2. a tool used in National Accounts to adjust components of the gross domestic product (GDP) from nominal terms to real terms. (For example, by eliminating the effect of the price changes from the consumption value)
3. a means commonly used by governments and central banks to set inflation targets.



Subsistence level

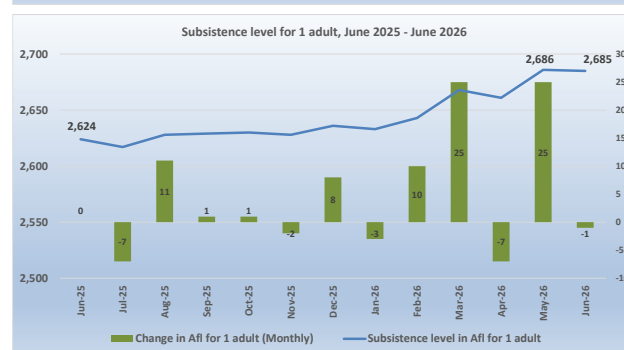
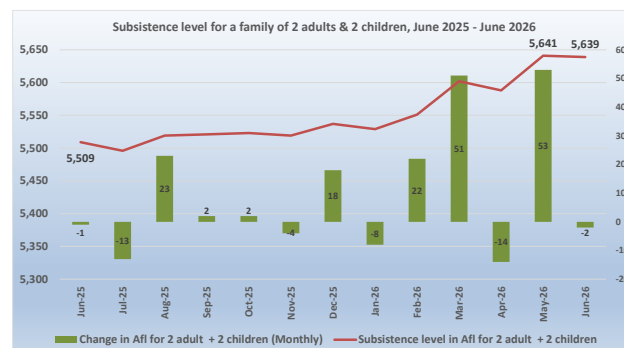
The subsistence level for a household consisting of two (2) adults and two (2) children (aged 0-14) in June 2026 was Afl. 5,639, a decrease of Afl. 2 compared to May 2026 (Afl. 5,641). The subsistence level for a single-adult household was Afl. 2,685, a decrease of Afl. 1 compared to May 2026 (Afl. 2,686).

What is the Subsistence level and how is it adjusted?

The CBS defines the subsistence level as the minimum level of income that is perceived as necessary for a person or family to be able to function in the society in an adequate and socially acceptable manner. When the definition of subsistence level is used, it refers in reality to a "Social subsistence level" and not the literal definition "the money needed to purchase those goods and services deemed necessary for living a life free of basic deprivation" (United Nations).

A subsistence level index was created by calculating the cost of the essential resources that an average adult consumes during a month. Each month this index is adjusted, based on the prices of food, clothing, shelter, transportation, and other items in the basket.

The current subsistence level is based on the "Subsistence level 2010" report published by the CBS in December 2010, and is updated monthly according to the CPI. The reference unit used in this report is of a household consisting of two adults and two children (aged 0-14). The total weight of such a household is 2.1 (1.0 + 0.5 + 0.3 + 0.3).



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The subsistence level in June 2026

The subsistence level is the minimum level of income which is perceived necessary to achieve an adequate standard of living in a given country. It is typically determined by estimating the cost of all essential goods and services consumed by an average adult over a specified period. This measure is commonly referred to as a basic needs index and varies according to the prices of food, clothing, housing, transport, and other items included in the consumption basket. Equivalent scales are used to adjust the assumed standard of living, of households of different sizes and composition. The scale assigns a weight of 1.0 for the first adult and 0.5 for each additional adult in the household (aged 15+) and a weight of 0.3 for each child (aged 0-14). The subsistence level is based on the figures presented in the report “*Bestaansminimum 2010*” and is updated monthly for inflation using the CPI. The reference unit used in this report is a household consisting of two (2) adults and two (2) children (aged 0-14).

In June 2026, the monthly subsistence level for a household consisting of two (2) adults and two (2) children (aged 0-14) was Afl. 5,639, an increase of Afl. 130 compared with June 2025 (Afl. 5,509). This increase was mainly driven by rises of Afl. 81 and Afl. 32 in the sectors “Food and non-alcoholic beverages” and “Transport”, respectively. The largest decrease was recorded in the sector “Clothing and footwear” (Afl. -16).

In June 2026, the monthly subsistence level for a single-adult household was Afl. 2,685, resulting in an income deficit of Afl. 678. This represents an increase of Afl. 40 compared with the deficit recorded one year earlier (Afl. 638). This deficit is the highest recorded for the month of June over the past six (6) years. For clarification, we have added two columns to Table 3: (1) the income supplement (“*reparatietoeslag*”), which provides additional support to eligible workers; and (2) the estimated income deficit, which is reduced by this supplement, thereby improving the financial position of minimum-wage earners. The current approach will be maintained to ensure consistency and comparability.

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Change in prices of crude oil, utilities, gasoline and diesel in June 2026

The prices of utilities (electricity and water), gasoline, and diesel are largely influenced by international crude oil prices. In June 2026, the average price per barrel of crude oil fell to US\$ 86.00, representing a decrease of US\$ 16.34 (16.0%) compared with May 2026 (US\$ 102.34).

The prices of electricity and water remained unchanged compared with May 2026. As a result, the average price of electricity per household remained at Afl. 263.67, while the average price of water per household remained at Afl. 168.73.

In June 2026, the price of gasoline registered an increase of Afl. 11.30 cents (4.3%), contributing 0.21 ppts to the CPI. The price of diesel remained unchanged and had no effect on the CPI in June 2026.

In June 2026, utilities, gasoline, and diesel, as a group, increased in price by 1.3% compared with May 2026 and contributed 0.21 ppts to the CPI. In contrast, the remaining 404 goods and services, as a group, decreased in price by 0.2% and contributed -0.13 ppts to the CPI.

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Change in prices of Food & Catering Services in June 2026

The “Food & catering services” index increased by 0.1% in June 2026, following an increase of 0.5% in May 2026. The index for “Food at home” showed an increase of 0.1% in June, as seven (7) of the eleven (11) “Food at home” indices increased in June 2026. The largest increase was registered in the index for “Potatoes and other tubers” (2.2%). Other notable increases were recorded in the indices for “Meat” (1.1%), “Sugar, jam, honey and other confectionery” (0.6%) and “Non-alcoholic beverages” (0.4%). The largest decrease in June 2026 was registered for the index of “Vegetables” (-1.2%).

The index for “Food away from home” shows a slight decrease of 0.01% in June 2026.

In June 2026, “Food at home” and “Food away from home”, as a group, increased in price by 0.1% compared with May 2026, contributing 0.01 ppts to the CPI. The remaining goods and services, as a group, likewise increased in price by 0.1%, contributing 0.06 ppts to the CPI.

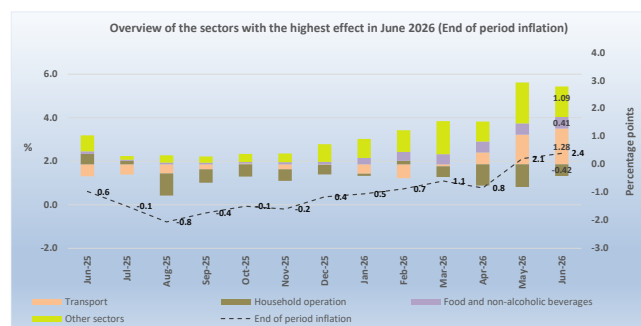
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CPI for the period June 2025 – June 2026

Consumer Price Index

Over the last 12 months, the CPI increased by 2.4%. Ten (10) of the twelve (12) sectors registered price increases. The sectors with the largest impact on the CPI were “Transport” (10.1%), “Food and non-alcoholic beverages” (3.5%), “Miscellaneous goods and services” (3.4%), “Housing” (0.9%) and “Communications” (2.6%), which contributed 1.28, 0.41, 0.41, 0.23 and 0.23 ppts, respectively. The increases in the remaining sectors contributed a combined 0.36 ppts to the CPI over the period June 2025 - June 2026.



The aforementioned increases were partially offset by decreases in the indices for the “Household Operation” (-4.7%) and “Clothing and Footwear” (-6.4%) sectors, resulting in effects of -0.42 and -0.15 percentage points, respectively, on the CPI for June 2025 to June 2026.

The increase in the “Transport” sector was mainly driven by a 14.9% increase in the category “Operation of personal transport equipment”, which contributed 1.16 ppts. The increase in the “Food and non-alcoholic beverages” sector was mainly due to a 3.5% increase in the category “Food”, which contributed 0.36 ppts to the CPI. The increase in the “Miscellaneous goods and services” sector was mainly driven by a 6.3% increase in the category “Personal care”, which contributed 0.26 ppts to the CPI. The increase in the “Housing” sector was attributable to increases in the categories “Maintenance and repair of the dwelling” (2.2%) and “Actual rentals for housing” (1.5%), which contributed 0.13 and 0.10 ppts, respectively. The increase in the “Communications” sector was due to a 45.4% increase in the category “Telephone and telefax equipment”, which contributed 0.23 ppts to the CPI.

The decrease in the “Household operation” sector was mainly due to a 21.1% decrease in the category “Household appliances”, which contributed -0.50 ppts to the CPI. The decrease in the “Clothing and footwear” sector was attributable to decreases in the categories “Clothing” (-5.1%) and “Footwear” (-11.1%), which

contributed -0.09 and -0.06 ppts, respectively.

Consumption basket

Over the last 12 months, 60.8% of the products in the consumption basket increased in price, contributing 3.76 ppts to the CPI, while 27.2% decreased in price, contributing -1.39 ppts. The remaining 12.0% showed no price change. The prices of both goods (2.5%) and services (2.2%) increased, contributing 1.44 and 0.93 ppts to the CPI, respectively.

Subsistence level

Over the last 12 months, the subsistence level for a household consisting of two (2) adults and two (2) children (aged 0-14) registered an increase of Afl. 130, from Afl. 5,509 in June 2025 to Afl. 5,639 in June 2026. This increase was mainly due to increases in the “Food and non-alcoholic beverages” (Afl. 81) and “Transport” (Afl. 32) sectors.

Change in prices of crude oil, utilities, gasoline and diesel

The average price per barrel of crude oil increased by US\$ 17.40 (25.4%), from US\$ 68.60 in June 2025 to US\$ 86.00 in June 2026.

The energy index increased by 6.5% over the past 12 months and contributed 1.04 ppts to the CPI. The indices for “Gasoline” (22.0%) and “Diesel” (38.5%) also increased over the last year, contributing 0.94 and 0.11 ppts to the annual CPI, respectively. The indices for “Electricity” and “Water” remained unchanged and therefore had no effect on the CPI over this period. Meanwhile, the remaining 404 goods and services, as a group, increased by 1.6% and contributed 1.32 ppts to the CPI.

Change in prices of Food & Catering Services

Over the last 12 months, the “Food & catering services” index increased by 3.7%. The “Food at home” index increased by 3.5%, with nine (9) of the eleven (11) “Food at home” food groups registering price increases during this period.

The “Vegetables” index increased by 11.0%, the largest increase among the “Food at home” food groups. Other notable increases were recorded in the indices for “Sugar, jam, honey and other confectionery” (8.2%), “Fruit” (4.9%), “Oils and fats” (4.0%), “Non-alcoholic beverages” (4.0%) and “Meat” (3.7%). The largest decrease during this period was recorded in the index for “Potatoes and other tubers” (-6.9%).

The index for “Food away from home” increased by 4.0% over the last 12 months.

Over the last 12 months, “Food at home” and “Food away from home”, as a group, increased in price by 3.7% and contributed 0.61 ppts to the CPI. The remaining goods and services, as a group, increased in price by 2.1%, contributing 1.75 ppts to the CPI.

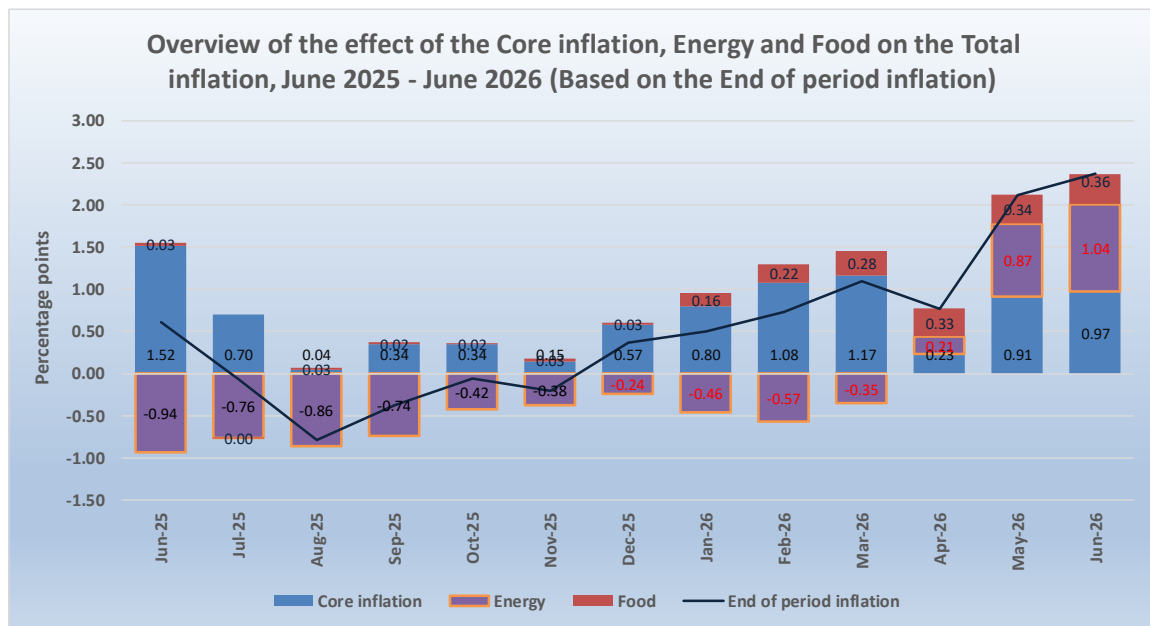
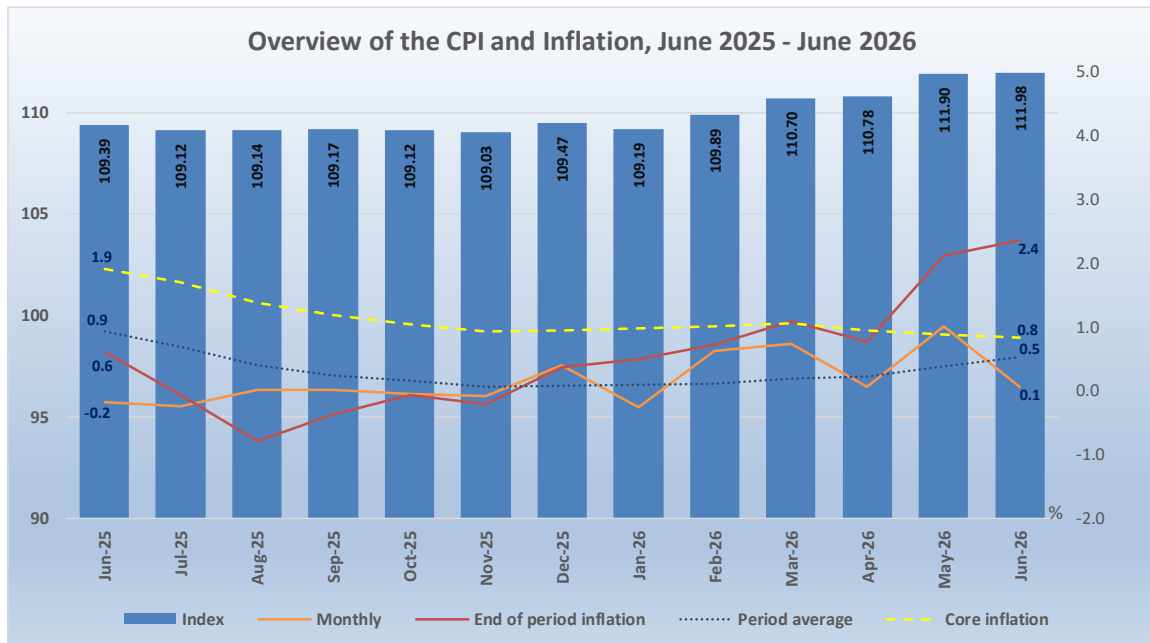
